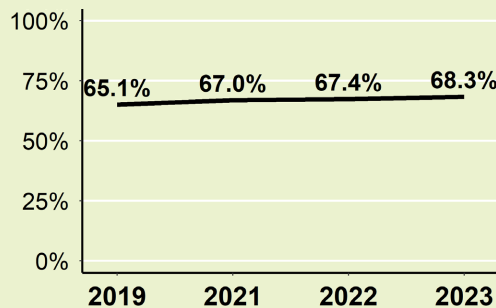

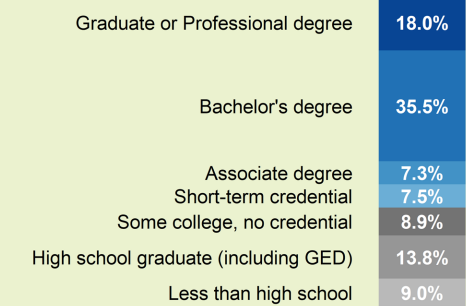

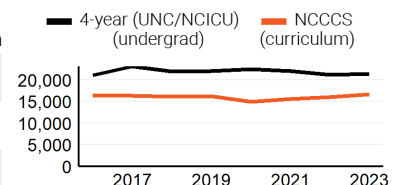

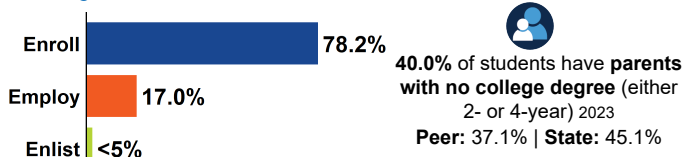


Postsecondary Enrollment

62% of Mecklenburg County seniors enroll in postsecondary education within 12 months of graduation, below the urban county average of 66%.

55.0% of 2024 high school class completed the FAFSA as of Sept. 27, 2024. 2,426 more need to complete in 2024 to meet state goal of 80%. Peer: 56.9% | State: 55.0%

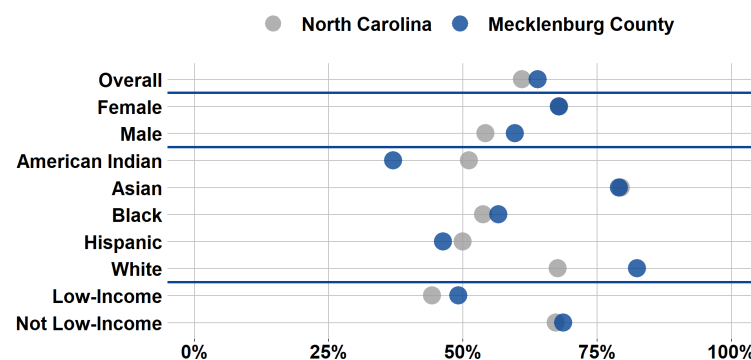
Post High School Graduation Intentions



84.0% of 9th graders graduated within four years. 1,272 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. Peer: 87.9% | State: 87.3% 2024

62.2% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months. Peer: 66.5% | State: 59.3% 2023

Top Opportunities for Growth



NC Pre-K Enrollment

31% of Mecklenburg County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the urban county average of 45%.

31.0% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program in 2024. 2,047 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. Peer: 45.2% | State: 57.2%

Mecklenburg County Traditional Public Schools students:

30.0% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in reading in 2024. 27,595 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. Peer: 33.8% | State: 29.8%

38.9% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in math in 2024. 30,210 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. Peer: 40.5% | State: 36.5%

24.0% of students were chronically absent from school in 2024. 19,428 fewer needed to meet state goal of 11%. Peer: 25.5% | State: 25.7%



Mecklenburg County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 232:1 compared to 281:1 in peer counties. 2024

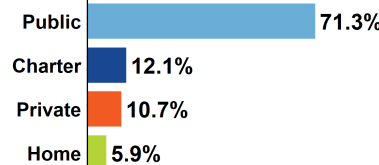

Pathways to College and Career

Students in traditional public schools completed 9,833 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials and 4,410 concentrations. 2,585 (26.3%) of credentials were industry-valued in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations: Hospitality & Tourism; Marketing; and Health Science.



11,404 (26.5%) high school students took at least one AP, IB, or CIE exam. State: 16.8% (2023).



2,598 (25.6%) high school graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs. State: 36.0% (2024).
